

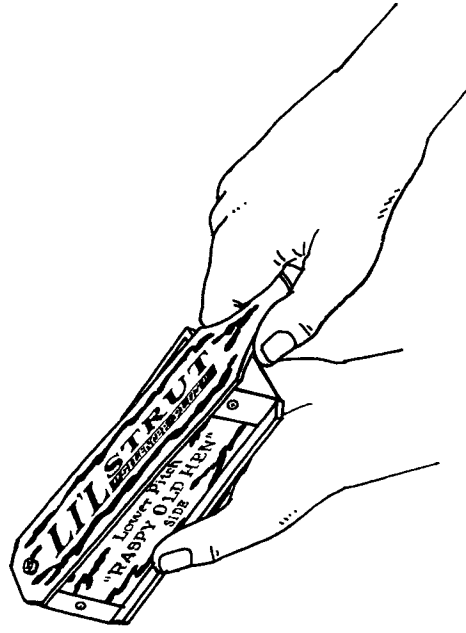
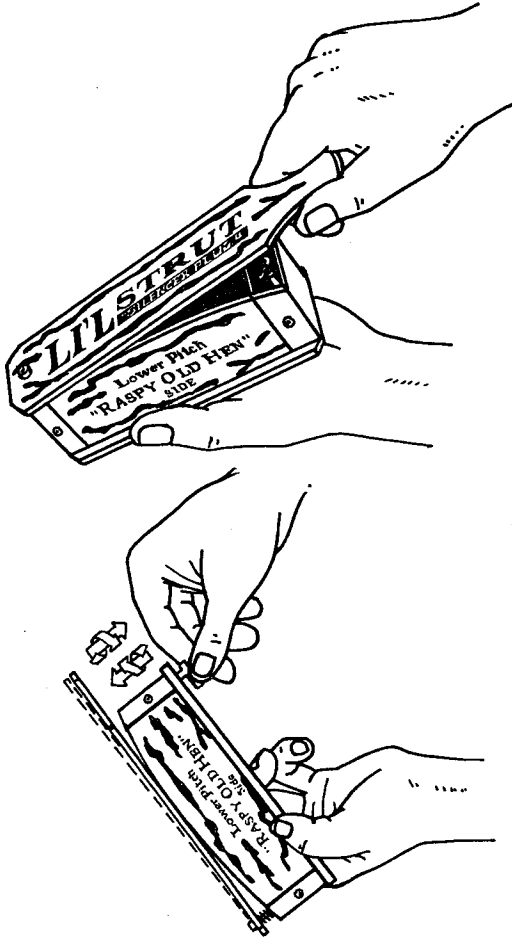
### Lj'l Strut Instructions

1. When locking and unlocking the paddle (Figure A), always make sure that you push the locking device in while turning.

### 2. HIGHER PITCHED RASPY YOUNG HEN CALLS-

Figure B-Hold base of call firmly with your left hand as shown. Paddle should be facing towards you. Grip the paddle with your thumb and index finger. Move the paddle across the *right* calling surface in smooth, even strokes. Do not lift paddle from calling surface!

3. LOWER PITCHED RASPY OLD HEN CALLS-Figure C-Same as above instructions except you stroke the *left* calling surface as shown.



- Locking device secures paddle away from striking, surface eliminating sound while walking or moving.
- Camouflage exterior provides excellent concealment.

### H.S. STRUT Wild Turkey Talk

**Yelp-A** hen call used to bring turkeys into range. To reproduce: begin with paddle an inch or two away from surface. Using proper rhythm, evenly pull paddle back and forth across surface. Start slowly and softly, gradually increasing loudness and intensity.

**Purr**-Soft contentment call used to bring in wary birds those last few yards. To reproduce: drag the paddle across the calling surface in short strokes, letting the paddle skip on the surface.

**Cackle**-Hen talk best used during spring to excite response from "tom." To reproduce: start with paddle an inch or two away from calling surface, then make 5 to 7 quick 1/4" strokes, finally into 3 to 5 long yelps.

**Cluck**-Close range hen talk that's soft and shows contentment. To reproduce: very softly, make 1/4" strokes starting from yelping position.

**Tree Calls**-Soft, close range early morning normal turkey talk. To reproduce: delicately make 2-3 extremely soft yelps.

### Helpful Tips

- Apply a small amount of lubricant to the lock spring prior to each season.
- All calling surfaces should be kept free of debris and moisture. Avoid touching any friction surface directly with your finger.
- Paddle should be kept well chalked.

When hunting in the rain, use your call tucked in a plastic bag; the calling surface can be adversely affected by moisture. Heat may also damage the calling surface, so never leave call in direct sunlight for extended periods of time.
